A RECENT SUCCESS

The pilot programme “Rodney Youth Pathway to Emergency Services” training workshops was held on 18-20 July for thirty Year 10-13 students in the Rodney area.

The YPES programme offered tasters from various local emergency services, such as the Auckland Civil Defence and Emergency Management, NZ Fire Service, NZ Police, NZ Defence Force, St Johns, NZ Red Cross, Coastguard and Blue Light. The youth candidates attended a three day workshop, hosted by the different emergency services. The experience enabled the candidates to apply their learning in simulated emergency scenarios.

The three day training workshop included :-

- A certificated NZQA First Aid certificate
- Hands on experience for the youth to put their First Aid training into practice scenarios
- Workshops from Triple One Care, NZ Fire Service, St Johns Ambulance, NZ Defence Force, NZ Police, NZ Red Cross, Coastguard, Auckland Civil Defence Management team, Rapid Relief Team, and Tzu Chi Foundation.

During the 22 years that Shane has worked in this area for North Rodney Blue Light, he has witnessed youth rise to the challenges that our programmes and activities offer and become very responsible citizens.

Working in collaboration with many community groups during our successful pilot programme, demonstrates that there is a real eagerness to develop safer communities. The youth who attended were amazed at the number of local volunteers that work in many areas of emergency services, including national and international disasters.

“Pathways” seems to be the buzz word around now. This is one area where we provide our youth with experiences and skills to develop meaningful careers. Blue Light’s affiliation with the NZ Police and their networks helps to develop our new youth pathway programme. All our local emergency services are keen to assist. With an accredited NZQA First Aid qualification this is a beneficial step in the right direction for the 30 youth who attended.

A highlight was to a meet up with a full time Silverdale female fire officer, Becky Wood from Mahurangi, who attended a Blue Light Defence Force camp 15 years earlier. Becky shared her experiences with the students on her career pathway.

Life skills, and our core values; **respect, resourcefulness, responsibility and resilience**, are key components of all our programmes. This was demonstrated well on our Youth Pathway to Emergency Service programme with each of the Emergency Workshop providers being thanked by an individual student and their willingness to participate in the scenarios.

GEMSTONES STORY TELLING

A popular story with youth and adults alike is being delivered to senior students at Mangawhai Beach School and the Living Way Learning Centre. In all ages and cultures, children, as they emerge from childhood, undergo a rite of passage into adult life. This is critical and often a difficult time for many of them.

Gem of the First water is a metaphorical rite of passage.

It is based on three principles:

1. There are right and wrong choices.
2. Good decision making leads to appropriate behaviour and good feelings, so building health self- confidence.
3. The steps to balanced living are quite simple.

The listeners go through three phases:-

- i. They identify with the boy in the story and then internalise his journey as their own.
- ii. They struggle with the boy's new learning and the decisions he must take.
- iii. They choose to take control of their lives.
